

BOARD CHAIR REPORT

Dear Shareholders,

I hope this message finds you well and staying safe during these uncertain times. The issues we are all experiencing both at home and work are growing troublesome, and while we continue to move ahead, the Board recognizes fully that this comes with challenges for us all.

Due to the changing situation regarding COVID-19, the Board of Directors voted to move from our planned hybrid annual meeting to a 100% virtual 49th Annual Meeting of Shareholders. The meeting will take place via web telecast and teleconference on October 16, beginning at 9:00 A.M. There will be no in-person attendance at this meeting. Additional login and participation information is contained in the Annual Meeting packets, which have been mailed to shareholders. The Board did not make this decision lightly, and we recognize some may be disappointed that we will not be able to meet in person for the second year in a row. However, because of the continued spread of the Delta variant, the Board determined that it was better to exercise caution rather than risk even one person contracting the virus at an in-person annual meeting. While the situation is regrettable, your Board is committed to protecting the safety of shareholders and descendants. While this outcome may not be what we desired initially, we believe it is in the best interest of our Unangax People. The Board has had to quickly alter the meeting plans and approve rules to accommodate these changes.

The Board continues to conduct business in a hybrid format allowing for in-person at times and a virtual option for members as requested. As a Board, we continue to conduct business, having just approved



this year's audit. This year's Annual Report and supporting documents have been mailed out, and we encourage all voting shareholders to vote their proxy to exercise their rights as a shareholder. Please watch for additional updates and communications on the virtual 49th Annual Meeting of Shareholders.

Finally, I want to make all shareholders aware that The Aleut Corporation will be receiving CARES Act funding, and your Board is actively working to administer that funding, some of which will directly impact shareholders in need. The Board has to act very quickly on this process. While we do not have details to report to shareholders or even answer questions by phone, please know that we are advancing in our efforts to launch opportunities very soon. Please watch your newsletter, our website, and eCurrents for details on all of this; it will be reported there first and foremost, so please stay connected.

On behalf of your Board, I wish you all good health and safety during this ongoing pandemic.

FRANCES LARSEN

Correction of age published in the last newsletter: 80; Sand Point, AK

Frances Larsen passed away due to Parkinson's disease and dementia on January 15, 2021, at Oasis Assisted Living Home in Anchorage, Alaska.

Frances was born to Gregory and Stepanita Takak in Kanatak, Alaska, on Christmas Day, 1940. Though raised in Perryville, she spent many of her years between Sand Point, Alaska, and Anchorage. She married her husband Norman Larsen in Anchorage on April 17, 1970. They grew their family of two to a family of six.

When she was not working as a health aid and EMT, you would easily find her gardening, passing you by on another road trip to Homer, Alaska, clam digging, and smoking freshly caught salmon. Frances took pride in helping others. She was one of the first EMTs who flew patients to Anchorage with private pilot George Kimball in the '80s. Frances was an active mother in her children's lives and, during school years, would make home-baked goodies for their school or community functions. She proudly graduated from the University of Alaska Anchorage with her Associate of Arts in 2006, at the age of 65.

Frances had a close and strong belief in God and Jesus. She always said a prayer for her family members and made sure to say each of their names. Before her illnesses, she traveled to Israel with a Christian group. She told her family, "I'm going to walk where Jesus walked."

When Frances was a young girl, she lost both of her parents. Father Harry and Jenny took her in and raised her. She loved her family and immensely enjoyed the time spent with a cup of tea. She will be missed dearly by her family and friends. She was very close with her caregivers Josi, Marissa, and Elizabeth, at the Assisted Living Home; they referred to her as "Grandma."

She is survived by her husband, Norman Larsen; sons, Allen Kuchenoff Sr. (Lou) and Robin Larsen (Paulette); daughter, Sharon Futch; grandchildren, Allen Jr., Courtney, Alaina, Alton, Parker, Arriah, and Randy; and great-grandchildren. Frances' son Thomas preceded her in death in 1985.



LAWRENCE "LARRY" CHERCASN

Larry was born in Nikolski, Umnak Island, AK on March 23, 1935, to Alex and Mary Krukoff Chercasen. After the Japanese bombing of Dutch Harbor during World War II, he and the residents of Nikolski were evacuated to Ward Lake, near Ketchikan. He returned to Nikolski after three years to find that the items they had been required to leave behind had been stolen or destroyed. He attended Mt. Edgecumbe Boarding School. After returning to Nikolski, he worked in Kotzebue inside the Arctic Circle. He then joined the Air Force. He was given a medical discharge and came to Vancouver, WA. He worked with the bridge crew and maintenance, operated the sign shop, was foreman on the paint crew, and eventually retired as the Assistant Maintenance Superintendent.

He enjoyed attending The Aleut Corporation meetings and was the 2010 Elder of the Year. He also served as a keynote speaker at the Youth and Elders Conference prior to an Alaska Federation of Natives meeting.

Larry loved to hunt and fish. In his youth, he kept the elderly women of his village supplied with geese. In his later years, he loved to fish from his boat at Neah Bay or Ilwaco.

Larry was a wonderful musician. He played with the County Line, Hallelujah Gang, and other groups, then sang with the Way Off Broadway Singers and the Vancouver Heights Church Choir. Larry served as a Stephen Minister Leader and was a certified Lay Speaker. He also attended Native American Lay Speaker training.

Larry is survived by his wife of 57 years, Patricia; his son, Mike; grandchildren, Kendra and Logan; and several nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his son, Dan; his parents, Alex and Mary; his brother, Jr.; and his sister, Lucy.

TAC BOARD SPOTLIGHT **KYLE FOSTER**

TELL US A LITTLE BIT ABOUT YOURSELF AND YOUR BACKGROUND.

I grew up mostly in Sand Point, Alaska. My father's family is from Unga Island, and my mother's family is from Belkofski Village near King Cove.

Growing up in Sand Point was a really great childhood experience. I was able to ride my bike all over the island, and go commercial fishing in the summers with my family as a part of the family business. It was a really carefree childhood.

In 10th grade, I left Sand Point to live with my grandparents in Seattle. I went to a college prep school during the school year, and in the summer, I'd come back to Alaska to fish with my dad. Before my senior year of high school, my mom moved to Anchorage; I moved with her, and I graduated that spring from Grace Christian School (GCS).

While I was at GCS, I decided I wanted to go to Seattle Pacific University to study Business. At that time, I hadn't learned a language other than English, and I planned to continue fishing in the summers every year to help pay for school. That, along with the help from The Aleut Foundation, had a tremendous impact. I didn't really know too much about ANCSA corporations or The Aleut Corporation or Foundation in general, but I did know they had scholarships. That financial support was instrumental in my graduating from SPU's international Business program in 3 years instead of 4. I initially spent time abroad as a part of that program - first in China, and later, Belize.

I started learning Mandarin Chinese

then as well. I'd be up in Alaska during the summers, studying my Mandarin while on the commercial fishing boat. After graduation, I actually lived in China and became more fluent in Mandarin using it in business environments. I lived there for two years, during which I got a job with Trident Seafoods. I realized I could use my business skills with the largest employer in our Aleut region; I felt like it was a way to give back and work with the people there.

Working for Trident was a great experience. I eventually became an international manager, where I would fly back and forth between China and Seattle as the liaison for our joint ventures and third-party processing. I met my wife while I was working there; we met in Mexico at the wedding of a friend I'd met in China. After we met, we moved to New Mexico while she finished her degree and got involved in real estate investing and running a vending machine company. I got my MBA while we were there as well, and then we moved back up to Alaska. I initially worked for a small fishing company called Aleutia, but the COVID-19 pandemic negatively affected that business, so I decided to bring my international business experience over to Eklutna.

WHAT LED YOU TO SERVE ON THE TAC BOARD OF DIRECTORS?

My parents and grandparents encouraged me to do so and were incredibly supportive. I wanted to get out of the seafood business but still have a positive impact on the people and communities who had supported me throughout my childhood. As I was researching and figuring out how to do

that, I discovered ANCSA corporations and the tangible benefits they provide for Alaska Native people. With the change in the seafood environment from COVID, I decided that getting involved with ANCSA corporations was really where I wanted to be, and I've jumped into it headfirst.

But yes, when I moved back up to Anchorage and was doing this research about ANCSA, the corporations, and the impact they have on our people, I talked to my mom and my dad about it, and they encouraged me to run. My Dad gifted me shares so that I was eligible to run, and everyone was very supportive. I just put my name out there, started contacting people, and eventually won.

My grandfather just recently passed away, and he always encouraged me to make good use of my skills. I remember he sat me down at the table when I was 16 and still living with them. He said, "I want you to be the CEO of a Native Corporation." I honestly didn't think anything like that would ever happen, but it did. He got to see me achieve that dream before he passed, and I really do credit his support and inspiration as a significant reason why I'm here today.

WHY IS BEING AN ACTIVE AND ENGAGED SHAREHOLDER SO IMPORTANT?

Being an active and engaged shareholder is important because it helps pass along that knowledge and information to future generations of shareholders and descendants. For me, my grandfather was the one who knew a lot about the company and the corporation. He told us about all of the benefits and opportunities that they had to support

our people, and he kept us informed about how to be involved and engaged. Especially for people like me who were descendants and not shareholders at the time, that was incredibly important. He was such a good role model for passing down that information and keeping myself and my siblings as the younger generation involved.

HOW HAVE YOU BROUGHT THE PERSPECTIVE OF SHAREHOLDERS AND DESCENDANTS OF YOUR GENERATION INTO THE BOARD ROOM AS ONE OF YOUNGEST MEMBERS OF THE BOARD?

I think that every generation - regardless of their age - wants to be heard. People want to see success, and I think that's really timeless throughout all generations. And for the younger shareholders and descendants, as well as our elders, I want to be an example of the importance of passing down the knowledge that will help keep our corporation thriving.

To other younger shareholders considering running, I would say that you shouldn't be afraid or reluctant to run because you're too young or don't have enough experience. If you have a keen ear to the perspective and advice, and have an understanding of how you can help benefit our people, put yourself out there. Take the time to really sit down and listen. When I ran, I sat down and talked with Stanley Mack and Tara Bourdukofsky to figure out what the Board and Corporation really needed, and whether or not I could help. Those were pretty important conversations, and I was grateful for the opportunity to do that and bring what I have to offer to help benefit our people.

WHAT DOES "EMBRACING THE FUTURE" MEAN TO YOU?

For me, it's not being afraid of change and not being afraid of failure. I think that's what makes you successful - getting back up on the horse, standing up after falling. It's been a tough year - a tough couple of years. You can get back up and be better because of it. The Aleut people are very adaptable. You can try to shape your future, but you have to have the core foundations and principles to be able to embrace it effectively. You've got to be equipped and prepared, and I think our people really do have that.

WHAT DO YOU WANT THE CORPORATION TO LOOK LIKE IN THE FUTURE?

I'd like to see the Corporation continue to have positive growth and more opportunities for shareholders, especially through dividends and educational benefits. With what I see in the Aleutians and how spread out we are, educational opportunities are the kinds of things that help give people the ability to improve and empower our communities. And I see that coming to fruition through the growth of positive, substantial, and sustainable businesses.

I want to see our companies grow their businesses so they have the buildings, assets, and people trained up so they can continue to compete for the long-term. That's a reality I think is achievable because of our opportunities and the support networks that exist throughout our region and communities.



TAF UPDATE
